

His vote for President was worth 3 of yours

To be fair, a vote for President of the United States should count the same whether it is cast in Thermopolis, Wyoming, or Allentown, Pennsylvania. Fact is, though, that the way the individual states cast Electoral College ballots, the votes of individuals in states with small populations like Wyoming, Delaware and Alaska are worth three of those cast by residents of large states like Pennsylvania.

Fortunately, under the Constitution, the power to change the way the Electoral College votes rests with the individual states and a national movement is underway to establish an interstate compact – the Support Popular Vote Initiative – to make each vote of equal value anywhere in the country. Seven states and the District of Columbia already have approved the Compact. And legislation is under consideration right now in Pennsylvania. We don't need to abolish the Electoral College. But we do need to make it fair.
